



# Moving on with Ezra and Nehemiah: Some thoughts from the Rector, The Rev. Alan Breen

"Separating life into distinct categories of 'sacred' and 'secular' damages, sometimes irreparably, any attempt to live a whole and satisfying life, a coherent life with meaning and purpose, a life lived to the glory of God. Nevertheless, the practice is widespread. But where did all these people come up with the habit of separating themselves and the world around them into these two camps? It surely wasn't from the Bible. The Holy Scriptures, from beginning to end, strenuously resist such a separation." Eugene Peterson

As we come into this new season of church life we here in Kill will be focusing on the book of Nehemiah. I for one am excited as to what God has in store for us as a church and I look forward to see how God continues to speak, guide and love us in this time. As we gather in different ways in this ever-changing time know and seek the presence of God. The beauty that can be found in Nehemiah can be found around us right now. How is God rebuilding our churches, communities, faith, relationships and mindset? These questions are exciting and challenging.

As we move with the Lord in how He is calling us, don't lose sight of the joy, hope faith and love that we have all been called to live in every aspect of our lives.

Then all the people shouted with a great shout, when they praised the Lord, because the foundation of the house of the Lord was laid. But many of the priests and Levites and heads of the fathers' houses, old men who had seen the first temple, wept with a loud voice when the foundation of this temple was laid before their eyes. Yet many shouted aloud for joy, so that the people could not discern the noise of the shout of joy from the noise of the weeping of the people, for the people shouted with a loud shout, and the sound was heard afar off. (Ezra 3:11–13)

I recently received a text from a friend at a time that some would wonder if it even exists (it was before 7 a.m.!) I really enjoy this time of the morning as it is genuinely the quietest time of the day. With all the noise that can be going on around us, sometimes it is hard to hear what is actually going on.

There are lyrics from a song that have been going through my mind and heart recently:

"I can stand up for hope, faith, love But while I'm getting over certainty Stop helping God across the road like a little old lady."

Strong and challenging don't you think? Where am I (and you) trying to help God out at this time when chaos seems to surround us instead of listening? As we continue through our trip through Ezra / Nehemiah we read the joy of things new and heartbreak and loss of what was. Take time to listen to what God is saying and stirring in our hearts.

# Message from the Archbishop of Dublin to the People of Dublin

Archbishop Michael Jackson has written a message to the people of Dublin as they await news of new restrictions.



"As I write, it is looking more and more likely that we in Dublin will have further restrictions imposed on us and be put into Level 3 of the Government's Resilience and Recovery 2020–2021: Plan for Living with COVID–19.

"I am sure that you, like me, find the prospect of this both frustrating and frightening but it is important that we face this with resilience and hope. The resilience that we will once again find ways of coping with these restrictions and in the hope that by abiding by these imposed restrictions, by looking after ourselves, our families, our neighbours and our communities, we will suppress this rise in cases.

"God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. (Psalm 46:1)"


# A Ministry of Music -Alan T. Jeffers



#### Micah 6:8

On 6<sup>th</sup> May, in the early evening, Alan played *I will bring you home* on his piano. He said it was one of his favourite pieces, "One they sang in Kill quite a bit...".

Dad, Papa, Alan, ATJ, apart from his life in business and enjoying his family, had many hobbies. Leaving rugby and hockey behind in his youth, golf and sailing were his sport outlets. His other main love was music. Rooted in his



faith, music was a thread in all of his life. All his life, he liked to play piano and pipe organ, and as he travelled he would often visit churches and have a look at the organ and if possible play it – he did so in the UK, France, South Africa, USA and many places in Ireland.

He was playing piano in Church, Sunday School, CSSM and Camps since he was 10. He recalled his dad regularly asking him to play a song or hymn, up or down a key. His mum used to say when he came home he would play his way through the hymn before he went to bed. This he continued for the rest of his life. At get-togethers and social gatherings he was admired for his ability to play anything in any key. It made life very easy for anyone playing or singing with him. In Church Alan had the "trick" of playing the final verse of a particularly rousing hymn in a higher key. It was almost his signature. His piano playing was influenced by a family friend Billy Hill and also Rudi Attwood (who played for Billy Graham). Playing the Hammond organ or piano with his brother Peter was also a favourite pastime. He had a huge knowledge of music. His prized vinyl collection included everything from Rock 'n Roll to the Mormon Tabernacle Choir!

From 1993 Alan took over from Betty Weir as the organist in Kill of the Grange Parish. He enjoyed chants, hymns, songs, canticles, choruses and those differences in style reflected in the contemporary and more traditional services. He could play old and new alike though he did struggle with drums! A 'tingle factor moment' was always when he added an organ backdrop to a contemporary song, giving an added dimension, with everything blended in.

Some yearly highlights for Alan were the 5.00 p.m. Carol Service and the 11 p.m. service on Christmas Eve, Churches Together in Holy Week, and celebrations for Easter, Harvest and Remembrance. Sometimes it was in combination with the Stedfast Band. Over the years it became increasingly necessary to form a choir for each occasion, using the right hymns and anthems. Along with seasoned reliables, new faces would appear, sometimes making the expertise uneven. Under Alan's guidance however, it came together in a seemingly effortless way. The camaraderie of celebration, spirituality, the meeting of old friends and new over coffee and seasonal fare were DNA to his soul.

Alan really enjoyed playing piano or organ with other pianists and joining with other Christian faith Communities for common Worship. In the years he prepared music for Sunday he systematically worked through the Hymnal, the Church calendar and the readings, always with reference to the sermon, the liturgy and the occasion. He said he was able to choose those well-known tunes the congregation would sing with ease.

Variation during the hymns mattered: words matching a tune, crescendo and de-crescendos, verses in unison, others in harmony, female/male solos and appropriate descants. He used the pedals and pipe stops to bring variety, texture and richness to the sound. Alan was able to draw people out to worship as he varied his interpretation when playing. As he had more time, he enjoyed playing for weddings and funerals. He especially liked to help at funerals for which he had a black folder. He would visit with the families and ask about music with special associations for the family, weaving it all into his voluntaries before, during and after the service, bringing comfort where words don't always reach.

Alan played In the Royal Hospital Donnybrook on their rota for the Friday services, and was often spotted there even when it wasn't his turn! He deputised for other neighbouring churches as the need arose. He valued his friendships in Kill of the Grange, he enjoyed the senior table at the men's breakfasts! He sailed with many, golfed with many and used his musical gifts to connect people with the Lord. One of the last things he did was to play keyboards at the more reflective Evening Prayer services. By then he was far from well, but happy to do it. He no longer had feelings in his fingertips, but a lifetime of playing and practice compensated for this. Nobody would have known.

Alan was called 'home' on the 7<sup>th</sup> May 2020. Dianne and Dee would like to express appreciation for those who came to Kill of the Grange Church on the 11<sup>th</sup> May, for the ringing of the bells in Kill of the Grange and The Holy Family Parish and the Word and prayer "for ATJ" We also appreciated many others who stood along the route to the Cemetery. You all brought us, and our families great comfort.

# Please note that the May 2020 meeting of the General Synod was cancelled owing to the COVID–19 pandemic.

The Church of Ireland General Synod 2020 was to take place in the Croke Park Meetings and Events Centre, from 7<sup>th</sup>–9<sup>th</sup> May 2020.

The Honorary Secretaries and the Standing Committee are considering a possible rescheduling of the General Synod to take place later in 2020, and will be guided by the latest advice from public health authorities, with the safety of Synod members as their priority.

Amen.




# Ezra and Nehemiah

# FROM GILL AND CARLOS OLAAKA IN UGANDA

August 2020

# Dear KOTG family,

Greetings to you, and we hope that you are safe and well as you read this. We are fine, all in all, after what most people may agree has been the strangest 4 or 5 months they have ever had. There is a cinema in a mall here in Kampala, and a sign on its window aptly says: "Until real life no longer feels like a movie, we will stay closed. Stay safe." When I last wrote, we were in the middle of a 2 week extreme curfew, with nearly everything shut, including schools and churches, a curfew from 7 p.m. to 6 a.m., and all public and private transport banned. Since that time, Uganda's infection rates have remained relatively low, though currently at 1,254 with normally 5 to 10 cases a day (though 31 yesterday could be cause for a little alarm), and with now 6 deaths. There is fear that the virus has spread considerably more than the statistics say, and that a number of factors have meant mostly asymptomatic carriers (we have a very youthful population, and generally our diet is natural and quite healthy, with fewer cases of diseases such as diabetes as in other nations). We have been so thankful that the medical facilities have not been overrun, and that the serious cases have been mercifully small. However, we know there is still a long way to go, not least because our airport is still closed, but when it opens, there will be a much higher chance of spread, unless the current 2 week's quarantine for all travellers continues, though this would be very challenging (there are just a few flights in and out, all special repatriation ones). Churches remain closed, which is very hard, and I was glad to read about KOTG being able to meet, albeit in the carpark. We do hope and pray that the KOTG families are coping as well as can be expected, and that the 'summer' is a time of some relief and rest, though of course we know many people have had to cancel travel plans. My big sister Gayle and family were originally meant to be in Uganda in July,



which of course could not happen, which was quite sad, but we pray in hope that the for a visit will happen in future.

The economic situation has remained very challenging for the majority of people, as I shared last time, so many live hand-to-mouth and have little in terms of back up or savings. At Abaana, we were extremely blessed to receive some funding resulting from a special COVID-19 relief fund, and we have been able to get food (and soap) to a large number of our beneficiaries.





When this project began in April, the logistics were quite astounding; we were based in our separate houses, with no transport allowed, and needed to organize buying hundreds of kilos of beans and posho (the most common local food) for it to be transported to the Abaana office, repackaged, and then distributed—when no transport was allowed.

Thankfully, we had set up online banking just as lockdown began, and with 5 staff all living quite close to the office, they were able to walk to the office, and after a short time, we received



permission from a local District office to use our vehicles, as that was the only way driving was allowed. Other permission was required from

districts, as due to the need to uphold social distancing standards, and fears of rioting (as well as concern that, with an election next year, politicians would use food as a 'bribe' for votes), the Government also introduced a regulation that all food distribution must be done through a Government task force. This required sending letters with backup documents to various offices, and thereafter the food had to be inspected at the District office before it was given out, to ensure that it was of good quality (tragically, there were many reports of corrupt people using similar funds to buy low quality food, in order to pocket some of the funding for their own benefit). The next hurdle was raising awareness to our sponsored families, so we went school by school, firstly notifying the local teachers by phone who lived close by, for them to try to spread the word for the families to come to the school on a certain day. The staff team would then set off, with food for 100 families in a truck, picking up military or police along the way, and then at the school community, meet families one by one to hand over their package. This was repeated 14 times, though with some trips combining one or two schools, and one repeat trip to the most urban school, as that was where people mostly struggled, as those in the villages could at least grow food, and so in some ways, the lockdown did not affect them so much. Over 900 families were targeted, and then another 500 in one of the northern rural communities received soap and salt, and 13 Health centres near the schools also received soap, gloves and other sanitary products. Aside from this, we were also able to send money to our 40 choir children, and over 40 families attached to New Life Homes children, to whom actual food couldn't be delivered. It was humbling to hear how the food appeared miraculous to many people, and also sad to hear of the struggles some children have enduring:

"Thank you so much Abaana Ministries for this food, it is going to help us so much because my mother did not have enough food for all the 8 of us at home, sometime for me I was surviving on jackfruits which we pick from the trees around our community" – 16 year old in Busia

Aside from this, Abaana was also a partner in an emergency hostel for over 200 street connected children who were housed at a vacant primary school, before 80 of them moved to a vocational centre.

The other children, after a time of rehabilitation (and of course COVID-19 testing, thankfully which resettled were all negative) were home with Abaana taking responsibility for 11 children, who were successfully brought back home. These 11 children spent a short bit of time at the New Life Homes before transitioning home, and we pray that the time they had with our staff showing them care and love and sharing the Christian gospel in word and action will make a long-term impact. It was an enormous privilege to take part in this project alongside the Kampala City Authorities, Ministry of Gender, and a local network of Christian organizations CRANE.

There are 11 boys at the New Life Homes, as others have been supported to be in their family homes, where they will be fully resettled in due course. They have been engaged with school work, as well as doing some projects such as looking after the small garden. They also had a great experience of participating in an activity regarding children's rights, in which they learnt about the wonders of 'zoom' and also got to interact with senior Government legal officials, to raise their concerns about how street connected children are treated.

With schools closed now for 1 ½ terms, we managed to send out some learning materials to our sponsored children, in the hope that they can self-study, but the reality of many children living in one or two roomed homes without electricity, without internet, and without a desk, has meant that doing any kind of home-schooling is very challenging. We fear that when school resumes, many children may drop out, as there could be unplanned pregnancies amongst teenage girls, and then parents or youth themselves may not see the benefit of school if they have been working and contributing in any way to the household income during this time. We are really praying that our sponsored children will still see the value of education. Schools may or may not open in September for what would be third term here, but the common assumption is that they may not actually open again until February next year – which is enormously challenging.

For our Josiah and Judah at home, we are very aware that we had a huge privilege that their school was able to set up a google classroom provision, for mornings, and though there are many challenges as Carlos' work has still been slow, one advantage has been his ability to oversee most of their school work, which was a great blessing. They finished the term well, with exams via google classroom (at 1<sup>st</sup> class and 3<sup>rd</sup> class respectively! The exam culture is quite strong!), though it was a relief to us all when they started their school holidays.

We have now had 1 month of no school, and it has been a blessing that our restrictions have lessened a bit, meaning we can drive, and occasionally see some friends for playdates.

Gill has been balancing days at home with the occasional office day, and it was a joy to have a devotion with the full staff team in person on Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> August (thankfully, we have a large meeting room allowing for appropriate distancing).






# NEWS FROM CMS IRELAND AND SOUTH SUDAN



Bishop Hilary and Mama Joyce remain 'stuck' in Arua as they were there for hospital treatment when the borders closed and haven't been able to get back. This is frustrating for Bishop Hilary especially as he can't be there to give leadership. Mama Joyce's health does seem to be a little better however, so we thank God for that, but she is still weak. Bishop Hilary was set to retire this year, but all the plans have been on hold because of lockdown, so he has been asking for prayer around his retirement and his successor as it is impossible to make solid plans right now.

The Diocese of Yei set up at task force to tackle COVID-19. They worked along two objectives:

#### Preventing the spread:

- 1. CMSI was able to send emergency funds from our COVID appeal to help purchase water barrels and handwashing supplies. These were distributed at a training of Pastors and one went to each community represented. The pastors were then able to pass on their prevention guidelines when they went to their areas. Some of the other South Sudan Dioceses have been making masks but they were able to purchase some in Yei for the training sessions.
- 2. Task force mitigation of lockdown impact:

Some of the emergency funds were also used to buy household essentials for those who were struggling during lockdown. There was a special gift from the team who should have travelled to Yei with Linda Abwa in June - they donated some of their team funds to the pastors fund and Bishop Hilary was able to distribute assistance to the most vulnerable pastors, who have been without a salary for a long time.

YEI VOCATIONAL TRAINING COLLEGE (YVTC) has been closed during lockdown, but reopened last week for one month. CMSI was able to send funds to support the month long training which is for those students who had almost completed their course when lockdown happened. They will now be able to finish off their training and receive their certificates. We do not know when it can fully reopen.

INFLATION has been extraordinary during lockdown and there also seems to be a lack of dollars in the country which makes funds transfers difficult. (CMSI now send all funds through Arua, Uganda) This could have a devastating impact on the already very devastated economy.

VIOLENCE has been reported throughout lockdown with incidences within the town - these were not the usual skirmishes but localised robberies and looting of shops due to the desperate food situation. In other parts of South Sudan there has been inter tribal fighting still.

Things had been looking up in January/February, but the pandemic and lockdown has made a yet untold impact on the economy and on the lives of families. There is serious food shortage.

#### KILL O'THE GRANGE INVOLVEMENT

Just before lockdown here, we had launched a fund to help develop the Training College. We had had the first of 3 planned retiring collections and then we were unable to meet in church for more. That Sunday we gratefully received € 208:40. If you are able and would like to contribute further to our target of €4000, the Parish Office will accept cheques, cash or bank drafts. As you can see from the above news the need is mighty.

Rev. COSMAS GWAGWE who has visited Kill told us the Theological College where he was Vice Principal has closed and he is now living in the Refugee camp in Uganda with his wife. He says it is impossible to isolate there and food is rationed. He is anxious and asks us to continue remembering them all in prayer, as he regularly prays for us. We can barely imagine what it must be like to have had that extra training and realising one's vocation, only to be reduced to living in such poverty. His faith remains steadfast but do we remain steadfast in our prayers? What a challenge!





# **Dún Laoghaire – Rathdown (DLR) Community Support Forum and Helpline**

DLR have set up a new dedicated helpline focussed specifically on ensuring the cocooning elderly, vulnerable members of the community or those living alone can access deliveries such as groceries, medicine and fuels. #### **An Post**

Special measures to help fight COVID-19 have been put in place by An Post for elderly, cocooning and vulnerable people who can't get to the post office to collect their pension or any other social welfare payment. You can now allow somebody else, known as a temporary agent, to collect it. The Temporary Agent form is available in all post offices, online and is also attached with this e-mail. We would highly recommend that a family member or trusted friend does this for you. In addition, post offices will hold all payments for up to 90 days if your nominated Temporary Agent is not available on your normal pension collecting day, and the timing of payments is now every two weeks. #### **SeniorLine**

SeniorLine provides a National Helpline, where people will receive the most up to date guidance on COVID-19 as recommended by Government sources. Good health practice is reinforced at all times.
