



RECTOR'S LETTER

There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called in one hope of your calling; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is above all, and through all, and in you all.- Paul.

When many of us are experiencing separation and grief during this lockdown it is good to be reminded of Paul's words from Ephesians. All of us even in separation are one in Christ. Our stories intertwine with one another and are important for us to know, and to share.

Karen Armstrong in her book A Short History of Myth wrote:

"Human beings fall easily into despair, and from the very beginning we invented stories that enabled us to place our lives in a larger setting, that revealed an underlying pattern, and gave us a sense that . . . life had meaning and value. . . . [Story] is not about opting out of this world, but about enabling us to live more intensely within it."

The stories that we live now will be looked back on with some disbelief and/or wonder. May I encourage you to live your story well and true. May you know God's role in your story as you are encouraged to love well and help those around you live intentionally.

"As with gladness men of old"

On The Epiphany (6^{th} January) we mark the visit of the Wise Men to the child Jesus (Matthew 2:1–18.) In the original Greek of the New Testament they are called 'Ot Máyot (Hoi Magoi) – The Magi, wise men or astrologers from the East.

They were Gentiles: the first hint in the Gospels that the Good News is for all people, not only for the Jews. They came with gifts of gold (Jesus' kingly nature), frankincense (His divinity) and myrrh (for His burial.) We guess that there were three Magi because of three gifts. It has been suggested that these were strange presents: Mary and Joseph had probably never seen gold before.

A legend says they were kings, named Caspar, Melchior and Balthazar.

They were looking for a king and at first they found the wrong one – King Herod. However the star then led them to the King of kings.

We can be encouraged that Jesus is still with us through the power of His Holy Spirit.

All hail the power of Jesus' name! A happy, blessed and coronavirus-free year to all our readers.

CHURCH OF IRELAND GENERAL SYNOD 2020



History made as the General Synod takes place Online

In a year of firsts for the Church of Ireland, 2020 brought us a General Synod like no other, as proceedings of the Church's annual gathering were beamed into people's homes throughout the island of Ireland. Synod took place on Zoom on 1st and 2nd December 2020, and over 400 people joined each of the three sessions which covered a greatly reduced agenda.

In his first Presidential Address to the General Synod, which was recorded in advance and shared online shortly after the start of business, the Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland, the Most Rev. John McDowell, spoke on three themes:

Reconciliation: The idea of reconciliation, within the island of Ireland and between Great Britain and Ireland, and a greater recognition of the skills, insights and perspectives of members of the Church from a Black, Asian and minority ethnic background.

Pastoral mission: Deeping the pastoral ministry of the Church's mission, recognizing that the very old and the fairly young in our society have "suffered more than most and lost more than most" in the pandemic.

Gratitude: The Archbishop expressed his personal gratitude to God for calling him to the office of Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland (which he took up on 28th April 2020), and to the Church for the messages of support which he has received.

skill to researchers,


comfort to everyone in distress



Olaakas—December 2020

FROM GILL AND CARLOS OLAAKA IN UGANDA

December 2020

Dear KOTG family,

Warm greetings from Kampala and happy new year to each of you. I can only imagine some of the challenging days that many of you have gone through over the Christmas season, but we do pray that there has been some sense of hope and joy as Christ's birth was celebrated. We also trust that God will continue to sustain each one of us as we leave 2020 behind and move forward, with a lot of unknowns, but with assurances that despite of everything, we can know the Lord Jesus is right beside each of us, every step of the way.

From 200 to 300 positive COVID-19 cases a day a couple of months ago, numbers have remained fairly stable, though we have jumped to over 700 cases in Uganda some days of late, but we are still so grateful that the majority of the people are not displaying severe symptoms, and many are recovering quickly, with the death rate remaining mercifully low. There is still so much uncertainty though, not least because the news of vaccines is certainly very welcome, but there is some scepticism that a developing country like Uganda will obtain access to sufficient doses in the near future. However, we trust and pray that God will continue to see us through this time, and are hopeful that schools may open, at least in part, in 2021. At the same time, we have elections in mid-January, and this can be tumultuous, and sometimes violent, and so schools have stayed closed during previous election periods, so we wait to see what will happen.

In Abaana, we closed our office on 18th December for a 2 week break, much needed for all staff. We had a special prayer and thanksgiving day on 17th, and we took time to reflect back and thank God for His goodness over a very challenging and unexpected year. We truly do not want to any credit for ourselves, as we know it is only God that has enabled so many blessing to be seen in a year of great stress and challenge. Some highlights of our testimonies of God's goodness included:

- 1. Every sponsored child received a mattress and 2 mosquito nets, with savings made from school fees that could not be spent.
- 2. Food parcels were given out to over 1200 sponsored children, with some particularly in need receiving these on 2 or 3 occasions over the extended lockdown period.

- 3. Sponsored child received educational materials such as workbooks to be able to continue some kind of learning.
- 4. Over 10 health centres and 15 supported schools received hygiene supplies such as soap and cleaning items.
- 5. Abaana was a key member of a network that supported over 200 street connected boys in a temporary hostel during the most severe lockdown, resettling 11 of these back to their homes to be reunited with their families and supplying food and other items so that over 70 older boys could access vocational training to help them start a new life with a skill post pandemic.
- 6. Abaana staff and a teacher from each supported school did home visits to sponsored children over the months they were at home, to provide pastoral care and to deliver special items that had been bought for them, as donors gave especially for individual gifts.
- 7. A Christmas gift package of basic food, special food like sugar (a luxury), soap, masks, a watch and a sweater were given to each sponsored child, with 15 teachers from each sponsored school also getting food, masks and soap.
- 8. As an organization, we added 3 new Directors to our board, and managed to have 4 board meetings and 2 general meetings *via* zoom, and also successfully submitted all legal reporting requirements to relevant offices, even though they closed for a period.
- 9. We started a new school project at Atukubui, for which we were fundraising during the '6000 miles' run, and enough money has been raised over time to build 2 classroom blocks and 2 latrines, and in December work began as foundations were due to be dug by the local community.
- 10. The New Life Homes boys were blessed through a special grant to learn some new skills including paper bag making and also received training in phonics and accessed specialist counselling, activities that were possible due to the increased time they had at the centre with schools closed.
- 11. Due to special appeals for COVID-19, Christmas, and Atukubui, Abaana received close to £100,000 in one-off donations which is incredible, considering the financial hardships that many people have gone through.

The unbelievable generous giving has greatly made up for the loss of income that occurred as no teams were able to visit, and also the potential reduction that will be seen in 2021, as there had been plans for a third choir to travel to UK and Ireland, but the training programme that was due to start in mid-2020 naturally had to be postponed. We are still unsure how next year will be, and could expect some challenging times, but for now we are just so thankful to God for His sustaining hand, and appreciate each person in KOTG who has given to our work this year.

For us at home, we have continued to be thankful for our health and for the Lord's provision, and the boys have managed to cope very well with the home-school environment for 8 months of the year, not least because we were able to do occasional meet-ups with some close friends, which has been of enormous benefit. We await to see what happens next, though we are looking to potentially employ a tutor to cover their educational needs as we wait to see how things progress. We have been thankful for everyone who has supported Mum and Dad as well, and the distance, though hard, has been manageable, due to His peace and presence. We have found great comfort from our church family in Kampala, and have been glad to be able to meet in person since November, and singing again on the worship team has been a particular pleasure for Gill. All in all, we can truly count our blessings, as we also pray for the year ahead, that we may continue to serve Him, as God wills.

- We pray for the Lord to be centre of all we do at home, church and work, and for protection, provision and good health.





Dún Laoghaire – Rathdown (DLR) Community Support Forum and Helpline

DLR have set up a new dedicated helpline focussed specifically on ensuring the cocooning elderly, vulnerable members of the community or those living alone can access deliveries such as groceries, medicine and fuels. The DLR Community Call Helpline can be reached on (01) 271 3199 (Monday to Sunday, 8 a.m. – 8 p.m., 7 days a week).

An Post

Special measures to help fight COVID-19 have been put in place by An Post for elderly, cocooning and vulnerable people who can't get to the post office to collect their pension or any other social welfare payment. You can now allow somebody else, known as a temporary agent, to collect it. The Temporary Agent form is available in all post offices, online and is also attached with this e-mail. *We would highly recommend that a family member or trusted friend does this for you.* In addition, post offices will hold all payments for up to 90 days if your nominated Temporary Agent is not available on your normal pension collecting day, and the timing of payments is now every two weeks. SeniorLine

SeniorLine provides a National Helpline, where people will receive the most up to date guidance on COVID-19 as recommended by Government sources. Good health practice is reinforced at all times. This information is updated daily as the situation changes and is available to each of our volunteers at the phones.
