





FROM GILL AND CARLOS OLAAKA IN UGANDA

September 2021

Dear KOTG family,

Hello to the KOTG family, with a special sense of connectedness that we feel after our recent visit; it was just fantastic to be able to share and meet with many of you just a few weeks ago. It was overall such a joy to spend time in Dublin after 4 years for Gill, and 6 years for Josiah and Judah – though it has been nice to be back in the Ugandan heat (it seems our visit was right in between the two heatwaves Ireland has enjoyed!). We loved every minute of our time, not least spending time with Mum and Dad in the context of their 'new life', and are so grateful for many people within the KOTG family who continue to offer them great support. Coming back to Uganda involved mixed feelings, as always, of saying goodbye to one home and returning to another one; but we try to be thankful that we do have two places we can call home, albeit very different. We found Carlos well (definitely him being here to meet us at the airport made the return far easier!), and the boys' robust excitement at sharing all about the trip quickly made up for any quiet or loneliness he had felt by being home alone! The boys have started schooling again, at home, with a teacher coming as she did for the last academic year that ended in June, so we are grateful for her and some stability in their education.

As I noted in my last news update, schools closed in Uganda on 7th June, due to increasing COVID-19 rates, and unfortunately they have not yet opened up, with no clear roadmap for when children may study in school environments again. It is extremely difficult for many families, as educational resources are few and online access is very limited. Children in villages have all but forgotten what schooling is, particularly for those in the pre-primary to third class range, as they have not been in a classroom since March 2020 (schools opened in phases from late 2020, but younger ones have yet to return). COVID-19 rates have gone down, thankfully, which have meant a lifting of some restrictions, but churches and schools remaining closed has been heart-breaking for many people, including us. What little communication there has been from the government has focused on the need to increase our vaccination cover, before schools and churches can open, but unfortunately the progress is still very slow. There have been 120,000 cases of COVID-19, reportedly, with around 3,000 deaths, and 1.5m vaccines given, in a population of approximately 45m. It is sobering and challenging to see how we will move forward, so we do ask for prayer for wisdom for our Government and for peace and patience as we continue in this season of partial lockdown.

At Abaana, school closure has been difficult, especially with so many children coming from rural communities so our staff are unable to meet with them or check how they are doing, especially as when the full lockdown was in effect, staff were unable to move for around 2 months, as cars were banned. Now there is some allowance for travel, but still there are challenges in meeting children as their residences are scattered around school communities, and often quite inaccessible. We have been sending out some learning materials, as well as connecting with children through local teachers where possible. We were also very fortunate that we were able to run another successful COVID-19 emergency appeal campaign, in which families were given food relief and soap to assist them during the lockdown. Approximately 800 families have benefited from this so far, as well Abaana once again supporting an emergency hostel for street-connected children. It is a real blessing to have offered a little support to people in need, including some of the children who travelled with the choir.

Parvin stays with her grandmother, who, although she has many grandchildren to look after, has a great attitude; when asked how she was coping she said: "yes, we don't have enough but God is providing: whatever we get from the garden, that is what we eat. We are privileged we have some little food from the garden." Sometimes the family would eat a simple meal of some kind of carbohydrate that was grown (such as a root vegetable or perhaps maize meal) with not much else but water for a meal. With the first package of support from Abaana, they were able to have beans and rice for at least 3 weeks, to at least see them through the worst of the lockdown (choir children received a support package twice within 10 weeks).

Support in terms of hygiene supplies like bleach and gloves, as well as handwashing cans, were also given to various health centres to assist the overwhelmed healthcare workers during the peak of the COVID-19 cases. We are very thankful to all those who have given in support of these appeals, and just pray that families will be able to stabilise in time.

At New Life Homes, in general the boys are doing well, and continue with home school as well as accessing various extracurricular activities, including counselling and discipleship classes online. We have had a number of cases where a child has returned to the homes after a period of visitation with family, mainly due to poor living conditions. One boy, we shall call 'H', who has been resident at the New Life Homes for 2 years, had gone, at his request, to stay with his mother for a home visit during lockdown. However, he had a very difficult time when his mother turned to alcohol due to the pressures of life during lockdown, and it was also revealed to him that she was not sure who his biological father was (there are two possibilities).

A paternity test is planned to help the boy understand his background and hopefully find an alternate home for him, through relatives of his father (as extended family care is common here), while we try to provide counselling to his mother. These kind of situations are extremely delicate and we do appreciate prayer as we try to help broken families heal and mend.




'Living History, Living Faith' project by 4th Class Kill o the Grange National School

The Changing Scenes of Life

Planet Earth has certainly experienced Changing Scenes since early last year! The hymn "Through all the changing scenes of life" (No. 372 in Church Hymnal, Fifth Edition, 2000) strangely seems to bear this out. It is a paraphrase of Psalm 34:1-9. It encourages us, through good times and bad, to praise God, and to lean on Him for support in everything we experience. Then we will be assured of His help: "...your wants shall be his care." In continuing to cope with the COVID-19 pandemic, it would perhaps be helpful for us to turn again to Psalm 34 and to the wonderful hymn which it inspired.

The words of the hymn were written by two Irishmen: The Rev. Dr. Nicholas Brady (1659-1726) of Bandon, Co. Cork; and Nahum Tate (1652-1715) of Dublin. Both studied at the University of Dublin, Trinity College. Nahum Tate became Poet Laureate in 1692. His output included the words of the hymn "While shepherds watched their flocks by night." Nicholas Brady had served as Chaplain to King William III.



COVID-19 Update

Public Health Measures that will come into place in October 2021

From: Department of the Taoiseach

Published on 31st August 2021 Last updated on 22nd September 2021

This phase will see the majority of restrictions lifted and replaced by guidance and advice to enable us to work together to protect ourselves and to live our lives to the fullest extent possible.

We will need to continue to monitor the ongoing risk from the disease and take steps individually and collectively in our everyday lives to keep this risk under control.

From 22nd October onwards final restrictions will be lifted, including:

- requirements for physical distancing
- requirements for mask wearing outdoors and in indoor private settings
- limits on numbers at indoor and outdoor events and activities
- restrictions on religious or civil ceremonies
- limits on numbers that can meet in private homes/gardens
- certification of vaccination, immunity or testing as a prerequisite for access to, or engagement in, any activities or events (with the exception of international travel)
- restrictions on high-risk activities (for example: nightclubs)

Measures that will remain in place include:

- self-isolation when we have symptoms
- mask wearing in healthcare settings, indoor retail and on public transport
