



RECTOR'S LETTER

JULY-SEPTEMBER 2021



But he was in the stern, asleep on the cushion; and they woke him up and said to him, 'Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?' Mark 4:38
Then Jesus came and found them sleeping, and said to Peter, "Simon, are you sleeping? Could you not watch one hour? Mark 14:37

There are moments I regret staying up late, and other times I don't. Times I'm sorry I was sleeping and missed something, and other times not. So much happens between these two passages above in Mark. Jesus sleeps in one, and in the other his desire for his followers is to remain awake. Many of us have faced incredible storms throughout this season of COVID. When or how do we rest? What does it look like for Jesus (or us) to sleep during a storm? What do we need to let go of for that to happen? If we don't rest at the right time, it can be difficult to remain awake when the time is necessary. Choose your rest and action wisely. We must rest in God and be awake in Him at the right times. How do we know when and how to do this? Listen for the prompting of Holy Spirit.

South Sudan News: New Bishop for Yei Diocese

There were great celebrations in Yei on Sunday 20th June 2021 when the Right Rev. **Levi Marandulu Yepete** was consecrated and installed as third Bishop of Yei! [He had been elected Bishop on 8th May.]

In a service that lasted several hours, retiring Bishop Hilary Luate Adeba spoke, thanking the various Governors of Yei state that he had worked with during his time as Bishop. He paid tribute to Retired Archbishop Daniel Deng and to the Primate of the ECSS Archbishop Justin Badi for his leadership and support.

He then turned attention to the Partners who supported the Diocese of Yei during his time as Bishop saying:

'I want to thank our partners in the Church of Ireland, CMS Ireland in particular, the Diocese of Connor, and parishes in the Republic of Ireland, who have partnered with us in the Diocese of Yei throughout our ministry. Without these partners our ministry would not have been the same... I want to thank you all for having supported my ministry and help make the diocese what it is today. Without these partners it would have been very difficult for us.'

ANNUAL REPORT SUMMARY

With lockdowns looming and no signs of COVID-19 dissipating, we moved our 2020/21 session online last October. We made the decision to only have our Explorers and Junior/Senior/Brigaders on Zoom given the very young age range of our tiny tots. Even at that, we found a lot of our explorer parents felt online GB after schooling online was just too much in one day so we look forward to seeing a much bigger group of explorers in person in September '21.



We kicked off our online sessions with a quiz and from there had a wonderful year with all the girls in attendance. We were very lucky to have a number of guests throughout the year and made the sessions as fun and interactive as we could. Prior to starting our sessions, we asked the parents and girls to fill out a survey to give us an idea of what they wanted from the year and what they were looking forward to most. Dancing and baking were the most popular answers and so we planned a number of our sessions around them. There was plenty of baking done- Christmas chocolate biscuit cake puddings, chocolate cakes in mugs, Easter nests and much more. We also had the wonderful Saran Barry from 'SaranB Fitness' host a session of Zumba which was thoroughly enjoyed by all. Aisling and Jennifer from the11th Company hosted a dance session that the girls loved and it was great to see leaders from another company be so generous with their time and efforts. We focussed a lot on the girls well being and mental health throughout our sessions, checking in with them often and doing a number of exercises with them to help with any anxiety and stress that was being felt from all that was going on in the world. We were joined by Jessie Syms from GB England and Wales on one of our last sessions to chat about coping strategies and the signs and symptoms of not being ok. Jessie is a mental health nurse working with young people and was wonderful with the girls and provoked some really interesting conversations with regards to school, mental health, covid and friends/relationships. As leaders, we were delighted to see the girls be so open and forthcoming in their discussions.

To finish up our year, we had a party with the girls. With restrictions eased, we managed to meet with the girls to give out end of year gifts and party bags. Our outdoor explorer party was unfortunately rained off but we had a lovely 'paint and party' session with everyone online.

I'm really grateful to all our leaders for the time and effort they put in this year and we very much look forward to seeing everyone in person in September.

I'd also like to mention the retirement of Louise Syms who retired last September, having been a member of Kill GB since she was a Tot. Louise has taught all age groups throughout her years with us but more recently has been with explorers and has had the wonderful experience of leading her own daughter there. Louise's love for GB and her commitment was admirable, we wish her well in her retirement.



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

Youth and Children's Clubs





Parish Prayer Diary 2021

Ephesians 4: 1-6

¹ I therefore, the prisoner in the Lord, beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, ² with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, ³ making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. ⁴ There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, ⁵ one Lord, one faith, one baptism, ⁶ one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all.

The above is a prayer Paul prayed for the church at Ephesus. They were very dear to him. Read it often. In the coming weeks let's make it a prayer for ourselves, our parish, for churches for congregations and fellowships throughout the world.

1st—10th July

Ephesians 4:1a 'I therefore, the prisoner in the Lord'

Remember prisoners of conscience everywhere 'As though in prison with them' (Hebrews 13:3)

11th—17th July

Ephesians 4:1b '....beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling' Listen out for God's voice this week, in the Scriptures, the news, conversations, the inner voice as you pray.

18th—24th July

Ephesians 4: 6c '..... to which you have been called,'

Are you being called to anything specific today, this week, for coming days? Pray that you, and that we all may grow in our different callings.

25th—31st July

Ephesians 4:2a '.....with all humility and gentleness.....'

Read James 3:17-18. Memorise it if you can.

1st—7th August

Ephesians 4:2b '..... with patience

What do you need to be patient about? Pray for help.

8th—14th August

Ephesians 4:2c '...... bearing with one another in love'
Pray for the people you find it hard to get on with.

There are four words for 'love' in the Greek language Paul was writing in: *eros* (romantic love), *philos* (brotherly, or sisterly love) *storgé* (love between friends) and *agapé* (divine love). Paul enjoins us to bear with one another in *agapé*: not necessarily a feeling, often a decision.

22nd—28th August

Ephesians 4:3a '..... making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit' Invite God's Spirit to make you a peacemaker (Matthew 5:9)

29thAugust—4th September

Ephesians 4:3b '..... in the bond of peace'

Pray for other peacemakers (Matthew 5:9)

5th—11th September

Ephesians 4:4a 'There is one body and one Spirit......' Pray for spiritual revival in all Christian congregations.

Ephesians 4:4b '..... just as you were called to the one hope of your calling'

'We have an anchor that keeps the soul,
steadfast and sure, while the billows roll.'

12th—18th September

Ephesians 4:5 ' one Lord, one faith, one baptism' Renew your Baptismal calling. Recite the Creed slowly.

19th—25th September

Ephesians 4:6a '.....one God and Father of all...... 'Repeat the Lord's Prayer slowly.

26th—30th September

Ephesians 4:6a '......who is above all and through all and in all.......'
Be aware of the people you see on the street, in a queue, in the shops. Study them discretely and pray for them.

Bishops' Appeal – Update re Allocations of Funds

Thank you to Geoffrey McMaster, Representative for the Dublin Diocese for providing the update below:

"Further funds for the India Appeal were released with gratitude to all those who donated to support the Appeal.

A Water project for two villages in Malaŵi to ensure consistent clean water and improved sanitation and to eradicate open defecation was part funded through Habitat for Humanity NI.

An Education project for 6 schools in Uganda to support the provision of up to date textbooks and school gardens that can provide a hot meal as part of a bigger initiative was part-funded *via* Fields of Life.

A Disaster Relief response in Tigray, Ethiopia, supporting people who have fled the ongoing conflict there with rations of food, tarp for shelter and medical supports was part funded *via* Tearfund Ireland.

A Health programme providing mobile health clinics for day labourers in more remote areas of Bangladesh who cannot afford to travel to get medical assistance focused on treating minor ailments locally, financial support for those who need to attend hospitals and tackling malnutrition, particularly targeting children and pregnant and lactating mothers *via* USPG and the Church in Bangladesh.

An Education programme in Bolivia supporting the upskilling of people in Bolivia who have lost their jobs due to the Pandemic with a train the trainer approach and a strong emphasis on supporting mental health was funded *via* SAMS.

An Agricultural programme in D.R. Congo supporting Mothers' Union and Youth initiatives through the setting up of Model Farms for training in sustainable farming practices *via* CMS Ireland.

Thank you for your support which makes the funding of these vital programmes possible."

FROM GILL AND CARLOS OLAAKA IN UGANDA

June 2021

Dear KOTG family,

Warm greetings from Kampala and I do hope that all the KOTG family are well and healthy, and with God's guidance moving forward well in this strange life we are leading. The good news is that from all I have read as I follow Irish news (mainly through a RTÉ app), as I write, things in Ireland are looking better than they have for a long time, and there is much hope of more interaction and fewer restrictions soon. I do truly pray that things carry on the positive note and that we have turned a corner. Sadly, in Uganda, we have entered a 'second wave' and gone into another partial lockdown. We had never really moved out fully out of restrictions since March 2020; there has been curfew from 9 p.m., some amenities like bars have remained closed, and schools had not opened up fully as yet, though most classes had returned (in phases). Very unfortunately, with an increase in infection rates, schools have closed again as of 7th June for 6 weeks, and so everything is on hold once again. Even more frustrating is that there had been a roadmap released from the Ministry of Education and all signs were that schools would resume normally in August. As well as that, very sadly churches have closed once again (having been open since November) and a few other new restrictions have been introduced, such as a ban of inter-district travel (very similar to Irish counties) and a stronger emphasis of all the SOPs of mask wearing etc. We are thankful that most shops are still open and people are not going to be as massively affected as they were last year, but it is disheartening when many countries are making progress that we have reverted. Still, we are thankful that though the latest daily rate was our highest recorded at just over 1,100 cases, total recorded deaths are still less than 400 (over a period of 15 months), which is truly wonderful. For us at home, nothing much is changing; the boys' teacher is still coming to teach them until their term ends on 30th June, as we had chosen not to send them back to school in January, and Carlos and I remain working from home a lot. We will definitely miss church, but we pray the time will go quickly and hopefully these measures will make a positive impact and our numbers will not spiral out of control.

Healthwise, we have had some good news and bad; Carlos and I both had our first vaccination, which was a great blessing, and are due to have the second at the start of July.

From Gill and Carlos Olaaka in Uganda

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Generally, the progress in the country has been quite slow and the vaccinations have run out a couple of times, but things seem to be moving forward with some hope that things will stabilise soon in terms of availability (a lot of ours come from India, and naturally there were delays as they went through their devastating recent wave). On the down side, I had quite a nasty bout of sickness when I was diagnosed with pneumonia, which caused some breathing challenges. We did a COVID test which was negative, but it is possible it was present before the test was done, and triggered the pneumonia, though it is hard to know for sure (the timing just seems strange otherwise!). However, with support from friends and much prayer we managed to get through and we are very grateful for the fact we could negotiate the hospital systems here at a time they were beginning to get stretched with this current COVID second wave. We are so thankful that the boys stayed well and were able to stay with some good friends for a few nights, which helped enormously. I am so much better now and we really are thankful to God for seeing us through a difficult time.

At Abaana, we had also been enjoying a bit of 'normalcy' before this latest lockdown, with many children able to resume school and also third level courses. Staff were able to interact quite freely with children and it was good to see schools functioning, albeit not at full capacity, but various classes being able to attend for shorter, intense terms to catch up on the months of missing schooling. Children were delighted to be back studying, making the current lockdown all the harder. At the New Life Homes, boys have started some tailoring classes which they have really enjoyed, having started learning the skill last year, but then there was an inevitable hold for some time. They really enjoy learning how to make items and it could be a good option for less academic children to find a way to provide for themselves in future.

We also had a great blessing in that a few sponsored children (including choir children and New Life Homes boys) were even able to go on a Scripture Union camp, especially for those who had finished primary school (known as P7 leavers). One boy Hakim had this to say:

"I was very happy when I was told that there is camp this year. While at camp, I learnt as a Scripture Union leader I have to live an exemplary life always and encourage other children to fix their eyes on Jesus. At school, I was elected as the Scripture Union leader at Juliana Junior school but I did not want to go for that position in secondary school but in this camp, I changed my mind. I will stand again, when I join secondary school because I have learned more good things in camp, like always to get time and have my quiet time, read my Bible, make good choices and friends, keep my body pure as a young boy."

There were also some graduations in the last couple of months, and a number of Abaana sponsored children were able to complete their courses. There were two very special cases of sponsored children finishing their degrees at Makerere University; one got a 1st degree in statistics, and another former street-attached child got a degree in psychology. It is just such a huge privilege and blessing to be part of the journey of these amazing, resilient young people who are so determined to make the best of the opportunities they have in life, despite the challenges they have been through. Both of these young men have pledged to offer any support to Abaana they can, through volunteering their time and skills when needed, and we are grateful that both recognize the hand of the Lord in their success.

We pray they would both be able to progress well in whatever comes next; both would love to do further studies and are researching options for Masters scholarships as they work in the short-term.

It is hard to imagine that the last time I wrote, Mum was still in the Rehab, but now of course she has been home in Springhill for the last couple of months, and by all standards, is an absolute superstar doing incredibly well. We are so thankful for the support and care she and Dad are receiving from many different people, and we trust that God will continue to be the source of strength and hope as they adjust to all the changes. Thank you to all the KOTG family for the support and care to them and us; it really does mean a great deal.



A GREETING IN ANCIENT EGYPTIAN



Ānkh! Wedja! Seneb! Life! Prosperity! Peace!

This greeting is found in Ancient Egyptian inscriptions, and is often used in greeting the Pharaoh. It is probable that both Joseph and Moses, familiar with the customs in Egypt, would have known this greeting.

It appears on the famous Rosetta Stone inscription, which can be seen in the British Museum, London.

The exact pronunciation is unknown, as Ancient Egyptian hieroglyphs did not use vowels.



COMMUNITY SUPPORT INITIATIVES ON CORONAVIRUS COVID-19

Dún Laoghaire – Rathdown (DLR) Community Support Forum and Helpline

DLR have set up a new dedicated helpline focussed specifically on ensuring the cocooning elderly, vulnerable members of the community or those living alone can access deliveries such as groceries, medicine and fuels. The DLR Community Call Helpline can be reached on (01) 271 3199 (Monday to Sunday, 8 a.m. – 8 p.m., 7 days a week).

An Post

Special measures to help fight COVID-19 have been put in place by An Post for elderly, cocooning and vulnerable people who can't get to the post office to collect their pension or any other social welfare payment. You can now allow somebody else, known as a temporary agent, to collect it. The Temporary Agent form is available in all post offices, online and is also attached with this e-mail. *We would highly recommend that a family member or trusted friend does this for you.* In addition, post offices will hold all payments for up to 90 days if your nominated Temporary Agent is not available on your normal pension collecting day, and the timing of payments is now every two weeks. For further information, please see gov.ie/welfare.

SeniorLine

SeniorLine provides a National Helpline, where people will receive the most up to date guidance on COVID-19 as recommended by Government sources. Good health practice is reinforced at all times. This information is updated daily as the situation changes and is available to each of our volunteers at the phones. SeniorLine is a FREEPHONE service and is available between 10 a.m. and 10 p.m. every day of the year on 1800 804591.
