RECTOR'S LETTER

APRIL-JUNE 2022

I love Easter, Always have. More than Christmas. I think one of the main reasons why is because it's not as focused on consumerism as much. As much as Christmas' main focus is the birth of Christ with an incredible journey up to that point, Easter is different again. The journey to the cross is a tough journey to look at. Easter is about the love of God shining through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. When we live out Easter in our lives it brings transformation in every aspect. The church has been transformed in so many ways over these past two years.

Cameron Trimble has much to say about this. She states: "We have an opportunity in this moment of our great transformation. We can approach this time as survivors, desperately clinging to our structures and ways of being. Or, we can see ourselves as pioneers, setting out in the face of the unknown to discover new ways to live faith-filled lives. The inevitable decline of our structures gives us the chance to let go of what might hold us back from that adventure. Nothing today will be the same ten years from now. Why not architect the kind of faith movement we want to see twenty-to-fifty years from now? What do we have to lose?"

Some Important Christian Events: April to June 2022

April

10th April: Palm Sunday

Collect: Lord Jesus Christ, you humbled yourself in taking the form of a servant and in obedience died on the cross for our salvation. Give us the mind to follow you and to proclaim you as Lord and King, to the glory of God the Father.

10th –16th April: Holy Week

Collect for Good Friday: Almighty Father, Look with mercy on this your family for which our Lord Jesus Christ was content to be betrayed and given up into the hands of sinners and to suffer death upon the cross; who is alive and glorified with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

17th April: Easter Sunday

Collect: Living God, for our redemption you gave your only-begotten Son to the death of the cross, and by his glorious resurrection you have delivered us from the power of our enemy. Grant us so to die daily unto sin, that we may evermore live with him in the joy of his risen life; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

May

26th May: Ascension Day:

Collect: God our Father, you have raised our humanity in Christ and feed us with the bread of heaven. Mercifully grant that, nourished with such spiritual blessings, we may set our hearts in the heavenly places; where he now lives and reigns for ever.

June

5th June: Day of Pentecost, Whit Sunday:

Collect: Faithful God, who fulfilled the promises of Easter by sending us your Holy Spirit an opening to every race and nation the way of life eternal: Open our lips by your Spirit, that every tongue may tell of your glory; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Moved by the events in Ukraine, Louis Hemmings was inspired to write the following poem:

Ukraine

Will families escape from city and village Will clockwork soldiers rape and pillage? Will some ******Gideon repel this Russian horde? Ukrainian soldiers don't fear blood-spillage; strong their spirits, freedom their reward.

** Gideon - see Judges 7, three hundred soldiers "slaughter" their enemy (the Midianite army was vast, perhaps 135,000)



FROM GILL AND CARLOS OLAAKA IN UGANDA

March 2022

Dear KOTG famíly,

Hello to the KOTG family, and we do hope you are keeping well and in good health. We understand that COVID-19 infection rates are very high but manageable in terms of the severity of cases. Here I would say it is similar, though the reported numbers of infection rates are minimal, mainly due to the fact that the actual number of people being tested is low (and we don't have lateral flow tests in circulation), so while there are very many people with 'cough and flu' (especially children), thankfully there are very few reported cases of any great magnitude and hospitals are operating normally. Unfortunately, the cost of living is spiralling here, as I know it is in Ireland, mainly because fuel prices have been extremely high for 2 or 3 months now (5000 UGX a litre, which is 1.25 euro; it is normally at 1 euro or less; in context, salary ranges here are notoriously varied, but people can earn as little as 100 euro a month, to a reasonable monthly salary being 700-1000 euro). With the devastating war in Ukraine, our prayers are for the people suffering so terribly; that it would end with as few losses as possible; and of course, for God's intervention in the negative overspill experienced in the rest of the world.

Schools did open again on 10th January as had been predicted in late 2021, though the opening was slow and tentative, with quite a lot of trepidation for students, some of whom had not been in a classroom since March 2020. Thankfully, it has gone well, above most expectations (aside from the flu/cough mentioned above). Abaana staff have been going around the 16 schools to give out scholastic materials like pens and exercise books to sponsored children and to support school leadership. There has also been a very nice exercise of giving out 'Christmas bundle 2' gifts; these were a spillover from the normal Christmas gift distribution which happened in December 2021, with some children getting an additional present of some special food items and 'croc shoes' which were very well received.

As well as this, we have been able to take some steps forward in offering support to the new partner school, Atukubui, which was built in 2021. Some textbooks were donated in late 2021, and the Chairman of the School Management Committee couldn't contain his excitement:

"I would like to note that I studied from this school and indeed we never had such a donation of resources as this. Thank you for choosing us among the so many needy people across the country. We are grateful; we are a changed and grateful community. The Lord bless you for this." Additionally, the children in P6 and P7 were all given a new school bag and a maths set, as well as pens and exercise books. Because this is a new school, there are not yet any sponsored children, and so these older children, especially those about to leave to go to Secondary, will only benefit from the lovely new buildings for a short time. The delight for these 69 children who received these items is hard to describe; in the entire school, not a single child owned an actual school bag (some had fashioned a kind of material 'pocket' from leftover uniform material and hung with a string strap, where possible) and, without any sense of jealousy, the entire 350+ other pupils jubilated with these lucky ones, trying the zips, moving things in and out of pockets, and enjoying the feel of the straps on their backs. It is moving, humbling, and enormously enriching to be part of these situations and the Abaana staff themselves were overwhelmed at the depth of poverty some people experience, but at the same time, the simple gratitude, generosity of spirit and hope that can be demonstrated alongside so easily.

At New Life Homes, the boys were very glad to return to school, as well as restart other extracurricular things like tailoring classes, which were paused for a while over the lockdown period. There has also been an emphasis on resettling children back to their families, and four boys took a big step toward transitioning full-time back to their homes. It has been amazing to witness reconciliation in action as parents sought forgiveness for mistreating their children or for not following up with them as much as they should have when they ran away from home, and boys sought forgiveness for mistakes made and poor behaviour. One of our social workers made this report below, which was very encouraging:

Boy 'D' visited his mother, whom he had not seen in many years, in December 2021. His mother was happy to see her son after a very long time; the two reconciled and the mother asked 'D' to stay for the Christmas holidays. Follow-up reports on the visit showed that the two seemed to have enjoyed their stay together without any big complaint from either party. In one of the phone call conversations with 'D's mum, she had this to say; "I was worried about the behaviours of Douglas when I saw him grown, but I was surprised during his stay that he behaved very well at home and I never picked any issues with him. As for Boy 'D', he was exhilarated: "I'm so happy when I went for home visits and reconciled with my mother. Previously I hated my mother so much for abandoning me but home visits made us to reconcile, we now get a long very well and I can't wait for the final resettlement when I will be with my family members. Thank you for this support."

At home, Jojo and Judah are still being home-schooled by their tutor, as this has proven to be the most affordable and manageable way to cater for their education for now, though we are exploring options for schools for September 2022 (for many reasons, they may not return to their old one, as it has undergone some changes and may not be suitable for now). Unfortunately, education is costly in Uganda for international curricula schools, but we are praying God directs us to a good option. They have been happy at home, and we ensure that we get out and about to visit friends when we can and ensure we spend holidays well. Our church celebrated its 8th anniversary recently, and it was lovely to be named amongst one of the 30 or so foundation members, around 1/3 of whom are still at the church. We are blessed to have two church families, and do appreciate all the prayers and support, trusting that each KOTG family is keeping well and knowing God's peace, direction and providence in all ways.

Please pray:

- We thank God that the school reopening has gone well in Uganda and continue to pray for children to catch up well and be safe and healthy. We do pray for a good number of older children in their late teens who have decided not to return to school; some are cases of teenage pregnancy, though some girls will go back to school where possible, but for other older children, they no longer feel that formal education is for them. In these cases, Abaana is helping to identify vocational training or apprenticeships, and we pray that these would prove good options and help these young people find a means to provide for themselves in future.
- We thank God for all the New Life Homes boys who are being reunited with their families and pray for continued good relationships. We are very excited that we will be bringing six new children into the programme soon, and pray for every child to find a permanent home and family in due course.
- We had a difficult issue recently when our car was in an accident when a mechanic was driving it (after he fixed a timing belt issue), and though it is now back, we were without a car for over a week; however, it is a praise point that a friend lent us a car for that time, and the damage was much less than expected, and no one was badly hurt, which was the main thing. We are praying that we may get a new car soon, as we have had it for 11 years (!) and when we bought it in Uganda, it had just been imported from Japan (as is the most common kind of car deal here), so it was new to us, but was already actually over 15 years old! We also pray for wisdom in our school search for Josiah and Judah, while being very thankful for Teacher Josephine, their tutor.
